



Vicar's Notes "Come to me"

Since the financial crisis of 2008, it has become ever clearer that we're all at the mercy of events and forces over which we have no control. The pandemic rocked the foundations of all our lives, and its ongoing impacts are like a series of 'after-shocks'. Financial news gets worse and worse: we feel as if we have no protection from spiralling inflation, and cuts in jobs and wages, which leave people with huge bills and nothing with which to pay them. We're left feeling scared and uncertain because there's no sense of security in our lives.

Of course, the truth is that even in the best of times, none of us knows what's just around the corner. Sudden death, terminal illness, serious injury, or redundancy can devastate any of our lives at any time.

Jesus understood the pressures under which people live. In his days, most people were extremely poor by our standards. They knew that, humanly speaking, it was chance whether or not they would survive from one year to the next. Bad weather meant bad harvests, which meant that food ran short. There was little knowledge as to how to treat illness or injury, and many people died quite young. People lived on a knife edge, which left them carrying huge burdens of worry.

Jesus spoke to people facing all these pressures, concerns and worries. He said to them, "Come to me, all you who are weary and burdened, and I will give you rest."

In another part of the Bible, in a different context, God says to his people, "Test me in this, and see if I will not throw open the floodgates of heaven and pour out so much blessing that you will not have room enough for it".

So, if you're worried and harassed, may I invite you to put God to the test? Come to Jesus and see if you don't find rest for your soul. Any of the churches in Bremhill, Calne, Derry Hill or Foxham would be very glad to see you, and to help you if you want to find out more.



Where Are our Defibs?

Do you know where our defibs are in the village? Don't wait for an emergency use Defib Finder. https://www.defibfinder.uk



Click otherwise continue,

Continue, enter your postcode or Derry Hill, Calne and you will see the location of the six defibs in Derry Hill and Studley. Click on each marker to see precise location, its ready status, and how to get there. Or check up on other locations you visit regularly.

Cardiac Arrest - 999 & CPR ASAP

If you see a person in cardiac arrest, call 999 immediately and start CPR. You will be told what to do by the 999 operator while you wait for an ambulance to arrive.

Time is critical and CPR is necessary to maintain an oxygen supply to the brain and other organs until the heart can be restarted by defibrillation shock.

You don't need to be qualified to do CPR or to use a defib, you are trying to save a life!

How to Save a Life (CPR & Defib training)

The Sky at night

In May 2025, the night sky will offer several interesting sights. including the Eta Aguariid meteor shower. Comet C/2025 (SWAN), and the Flower Moon. The Eta Aquariid meteor shower will peak May 5th. Comet SWAN will be visible low in the northwest twilight



after sunset, near the Pleiades star cluster.

The Eta Aquariid Meteor Shower is active from April 19th to May 28th, peaking between midnight and dawn on May 5th. It's predicted to have a rate of up to 40 meteors per hour. While it favours the Southern Hemisphere, it's still possible to see it in the eastern sky in the early predawn hours from the UK, even when the radiant is below the horizon. The shower is caused by debris from Halley's Comet and is named after the constellation Aquarius and the star Eta Aquarii.

The Comet C/2025 F2 (SWAN) will be visible low in the northwest twilight after sunset, close to the Pleiades star cluster. Southern hemisphere observers will have better views than those in the Northern Hemisphere.

Flower Moon, so called as many flowers are in bloom during this month, will be visible from about 21:28 BST on May 12th. It will be beneath the constellation Libra and won't rise very high in the sky. Another Celestial event is the large asteroid Vesta which will reach opposition on May 2nd, making it closest to Earth and brightest during that time.

100 years ago, we were at war

In January 1915, the first German Zepplin raid happened on the east coast of England. Diverted by strong winds from their original industrial targets on the Humber estuary, the two airships involved, the L3 and L 4, dropped 24 high explosive bombs, killing 4 people and causing 'untold' damage, estimated at almost £8,000.

On the 22nd April 1915, the Second Battle of Ypres had begun. Germany used poison gas for the first time in a major offensive. At 17.00 hours, German soldiers open the valves and release almost 200 tonnes of chlorine gas across a 4km front. Being heavier than air, they rely on the wind direction to blow the gas towards the French trenches. 6,000 Allied troops die within 10 minutes.

By May 1915 there were significant war preparations being made across the country.

On the 15th May 1915 the Wiltshire Telegraph reported the Military Camp at Bowood.

"By the end of next week, the whole of the second lst Mounted Brigade of the Southern Division will be under canvas at Bowood for the purpose of completing their training. The Marquess of Lansdowne has placed his park at the disposal of the military authorities, and the change from being billeted in private and licensed houses in towns to tents pitched in these beautiful surroundings will be welcomed by the



men, whose physique and efficiency it will tend to improve. 'The Brigade will consist of the second line units of the Royal Wi, North Somerset, Dorset, and Hants Regiments of Yeomanry, the Hampshire Royal Horse Artillery, the Field Ambulance R.A. Medical Corps, and the Transport and Supply Column A.S.C., the total strength being estimated at 2,500.

The camp will form a semi-circle extending from near the entrance at the Golden Gates to Rumsey House, and embracing that part known as Queenwood (the length of the Golf Course Walk).



The Wiltshire's being the home county in-between the place of honour near the Golden gates assuming them are the North Somerset and dividing these regiments from the Dorsets and Hants are the K AM.C. in a field adjoining the old road to Studley. The Army Service Corps, for the purpose of being ready to handle supplies coming in by rail, are located in a field at the rear of the goods sheds at Black Dog siding. 'The conduct of the men during the period of their residence in these towns has been exemplary; not a complaint has been received by the police as to their behaviour, and they have left nothing but the most pleasant memories of their stay. About it is to the advantage of the men that they should have a more extended scope for training,

and that they will find surrounded extensive grounds at Bowood the diversified character of which makes them well suited training troops. Advanced parties left the headquarters at Chippenham on Saturday. and when the regiment arrived in camp at about two o'clock on Monday they found all the arrangements practically complete for their reception. The strength of which is 418, and is under the command of Colonel Poore, Major Fuller is second in command, and the other officers of the three Squadrons include Major Richardson Cox, Major Webster, Captain Buxton, Captain Lysley, Captain Bennett, A.V.C., Lieutenants K Rooke, Chandler, Baines, Meyers, Hudson, Hawkings, Beaven, Cowan, Creasy, and Llewellyn. Ist regimental civil medical practitioner Dr Ferguson, of Calne, Dr Buxton, had a commission in the Royal Army Medical Corps, and is now on active service. The head of the non-commissioned officers is Regimental Sergeant-Major Walters, who has fought against his country's enemies in various parts of the world and has rendered valuable service in the training of the troops. The arrangements for the feeding of the troops are carried out by the Regimental Mess and are entirely satisfactory. The provision of an ample supply of pure water for a camp of this magnitude is of importance, and Lord Lansdowne placed his private source at the disposal of the military authorities. This is at Lady Spout, about a mile and a half from the camp; here a reservoir has been constructed capable of holding 10,000 gallons, and this is fed by two sets of pumps capable of raising 3,000 gallons an hour. The camp is 160 feet above the spring, and the water is contained by a three-inch main, which extends to the Hants and Dorset lines on the north side. Between the Wilts and Somerset camps there are four tanks with a storage capacity of 6,000 gallons. The whole of this work has been satisfactorily carried out by Mr. Maundrell, and Messrs. k. J. Drew and Sons, of Calne.

There are five lines of horse troughs, and these have been fitted up by Messrs Long, of Bath. Special attention has been given to the sanitary arrangements, which are of a complete character. It is too early yet to state in detail the work which the men will have to perform each day. The recruits, of whom there are 80, will have mounted and foot drills for the present, and all the other men are engaged in squadron and troop drill. At half-past seven every morning there will be a medical inspection by Dr Ferguson, who has already ordered one man to hospital, the servants' quarters at one part of Bowood House being used for this purpose. Provision has been made for 17 patients. We may here state that Lady Lansdowne has taken the greatest interest in the arrangements of the hospital, where removal cases will

be treated. The hospital will be conducted by the Calne Voluntary Aid Detachment, of which Mrs Ferguson is commandant. All cases of fracture will be dealt with in the Pavilion Hospital in the Calne Recreation Ground; this is under the superintendence of Mrs. J. M. Harris, acting as assistant commandant, and so will have the assistance of Nurses Garne, Gowan, and Godfrey. Cases of an infectious nature will be sent to the Operation Hospital.

Adjoining the Wilts Yeomanry are the North Somerset: the three squadrons are at full strength, the total rank and file being 482, The commanding officer is Lieutenant A, Gibbs, M.P., the second in command is Major A. L. Langman. C.M.G., and the other officers are Adjutant H. Carron-Serimgeour, Major A. H. Baker-Hahlo, Major Cooke-Hurle. Major Lord Wolverton, Cfuin C. F. Lattrell, Captain Gi. J. Joicey, and Lieutenant T. Rhind, RM.C., and Sqt.-Major King-Brain. The dismounted portion of the regiment came by train from Bath on Monday morning, and the mounted version by route march, reached the camp at about half-past six o'clock on Monday evening. The Field Ambulance, which comes from Swindon. has also taken up its quarters, and on Wednesday the Dorset Yeomanry arrived. The Hants are not expected till next week. The Transport and Supply Column is in command of Lieutenant Harman. The Brigadier Colonel Edwards, D. 5.0., and the second in command is Brigade Major J. Hamilton Sergeant Rendell (Devizes) of the Royal Wilts Yeomanry, is in charge of the brigade head."

One of the first Derry Hill men to fall in WW1 was Fred Bull. Fred lived at Loxwell Farm - on the Devizes Road as you leave Derry Hill heading for Sandy Lane. Fred had two brothers; John and George. Fred served with the Wiltshire Regiment. He was killed in action at the battle of Hooge and Bellewaarde near Ypres in Belgium on 25th September 1915 aged 22. Fred's body was never recovered. His name is carved onto the Menin Gate and is scribed onto his brother's grave (John Bull) at Christ Church.

Crime and incident updates

- •Between 17-18/03/2025 a Ukrainian flag was stolen from a property in Foxham.
- •On 20/03/2024 at 19:29hrs, officers attended a two-vehicle road traffic collision on the A4 Black dog hill. One driver was arrested on suspicion of driving over the prescribed limit of alcohol. Other driver involved suffered minor injuries. Both vehicles were recovered due to extensive damage.
- •On 22/03/2025 at 13:34hrs, officers attended a single vehicle road traffic collision involving a motorcycle. The rider of the motorcycle was taken to hospital due to a suspected broken hip.
- •Between 25/03/2025 16:00hrs and 26/03/2025 07:30, unknown persons have cut off a padlock to a gate near to Chilvester Hill, Calne.
- •On 27/03/2025 at 14:10hrs, officers had seen two males wearing balaclavas attempt to burgle an address in Swindon. A vehicle has been stopped, and the occupants were searched in Hilmarton. The two males were arrested on suspicion of attempted burglary.
- •On 27/03/2025 at 13:42hrs, a vehicle was stopped on the A3102 in Hilmarton. The driver was found to be in possession of a small amount of cannabis. The male was given a drugs intervention course.
- •On 28/03/2025 at 23:33hrs, a vehicle was stopped on the A4 at Cherhill. The driver was arrested on suspicion of driving under the influence of drugs and taken to Melksham custody.

Nesting Birds

We are in a very busy time for nesting birds, and the Rural Crime Team would like to raise awareness around the legislation and responsibilities that we all have at this time of year.

All wild birds are protected, and Schedules were created to highlight their level of protection. Schedule 1 species receive the tightest of protections, with Schedule 4 species being at the lower end of the scale (but are still protected). Birds like Bitterns, Barn Owls and Ospreys fall under Schedule 1, as well as other species that are low in numbers, threatened, or in decline. Dog owners are advised to keep their dogs on leads when walking in the countryside to prevent disturbing ground-nesting birds.

Under the Wildlife and Countryside Act, it is an offence if a person:

- Intentionally kills, injures or takes wild birds
- Intentionally takes, damages or destroys a wild bird's nest while it's being used or built
- · Intentionally takes or destroys a wild bird's egg
- Possesses, controls or transports live or dead wild birds, or parts of them, or their eggs
- Sells wild birds or puts them on display for sale
- Uses prohibited methods to kill or take wild birds
- Intentionally or recklessly disturbing any wild bird listed on Schedule 1 while it is nest building, or at a nest containing eggs or young, or disturbs the dependent young of such a bird

We ask for people to educate themselves and be respectful around our wild birds. More information can be found on the RSPB website here https://orlo.uk/ipfCU

Warnings issued to under 18's in Calne

Since January, 4 formal warnings have been issued to under 18-yearolds using E-scooters in Calne.

PCSO Mark Cook said: "We have been targeting this issue, after concerns were raised by members of the community. Several warnings were issued last year, but since the start of January we have already seen several people riding e-scooters illegally.

"We will continue to give advice on e-scooters and the restrictions on using them if purchased. Anyone seen riding an e-scooter will be issued a warning and if underage, parents will be advised.

"We will remain focused on problem-solving interventions and will continue to engage with riders to make them aware of the law. Offenders who knowingly and persistently break the law will be dealt with appropriately, whereby the e-scooter will be seized, and the rider will be reported for any offences."

We would like to remind any e-scooter owners or parents who are considering purchasing an e-scooter for their children that it's illegal to use them on the road or in public spaces, such as parks, street pavements, car parks, town centres or promenades.

In recent weeks, particularly in Southwest and Southeast Wiltshire, with the most recent being this week. Considering this, the public are reminded to check the security of their agricultural equipment and plant machinery to make theft as difficult as possible for criminals.

Since the beginning of the year, 12 quad bikes or ATVs have been reported stolen to Wiltshire Police, however we believe this figure may be higher and some thefts may not have been reported.

Wiltshire Police offer owners of quad bikes and ATVs the following advice:

1/ Consider installing trackers on your vehicles – visit the police-approved Secured By Design website for more information.

2/Keep good records of your vehicles – take photographs from different angles of the vehicle, record the serial/chassis numbers, record the model number and any distinguishing features. Keep a personal record of your vehicle and register it on the national property database www.immobilise.com.

3/ Mark your property – mark an obscure part of the vehicle with your postcode and property name or number or use a DNA kit to forensically mark your vehicle. More information about forensic marking kits can be found on the Secured by Design website.

4/ Ensure your vehicle is secured when it is not in use by storing it in a locked outbuilding (preferably with further deterrents such as CCTV or motion-sensor security lighting). Make sure keys are stored securely and not kept within the vehicle/ in the ignition.

- 5/ Consider installing loud alarms on outbuildings
- 6/ Report suspicious vehicles and number plates entering your yard or grounds to the police, noting the dates and times

Anyone buying a £25 ticket to the fashion show will receive a glass of wine on arrival and exclusive access to the pre-loved sale featuring dozens of rails of nearly new designer clothes, accessories and jewellery at bargain prices.

The pre-loved sale continues on Wednesday from 9.30am to 3pm, where entry is free.

The charity, which works with Wiltshire Police to protect over 60s and people aged 18 and over with a disability, wants to add the cameras to the range of security measures it provides in the wake of burglaries or to victims of domestic abuse.

Director Jennie Shaw said: "Embracing pre-loved clothing significantly enhances sustainability by reducing textile waste and conserving resources. In the UK, approximately 49 per cent of used textiles are discarded as general waste, with every person throwing away an average of 35 items a year.

"Choosing second-hand garments extends their lifespan and, lessens the demand for new production and minimises carbon emissions. By choosing pre-loved fashion, we can all play a crucial role in mitigating landfill overflow and promoting a circular economy.

"The event also helps us to maintain our vital service. We receive no funding and we have to raise more than £300,000 a year so this is a wonderful way of finding some real bargains to refresh your wardrobe and helping a great cause."

The doors open at 6.30pm on Tuesday evening and access to the preloved show is available to ticket holders from 7.45pm. Tickets are available from wiltshirebobbyvan.org.uk/future-events.

Update on traffic calming measures for Church Road

In early 2021, Calne Without Parish Council commissioned a highways consultant to perform a feasibility study regarding several road safety issues within the parish. One specific area of concern was Church Road in Derry Hill, which experiences problems with speeding vehicles and serves as a shortcut for through-traffic. These issues have been substantiated by traffic surveys and extensive feedback from local residents.

The Feasibility Study proposed enhancements at five locations on Church Road in Derry Hill, with the underlying principle that "If you want drivers to behave as they should in a village, make sure it feels like a village".

The proposed solutions were designed to reinforce existing traffic calming with additional measures, such as using contrasting materials to enhance the presence of village features including the shop/post office, school, church, war memorial and village gateway.

The Parish Council presented these solutions to a packed Parish Meeting in April 2023, and, with the backing of those present, put them forward to Wiltshire Council. This was done via the Calne Area LHFIG (Local Highways and Footpaths Improvement Group), which is part of Wiltshire Council's devolved local government where proposals are then further worked on and supported by the Wiltshire Councillors on Calne Area board.

In April 2023, the Parish Council presented these solutions to a well-attended Parish Meeting. With the support of those present, the proposals were submitted to Wiltshire Council via the Calne Area Local Highways and Footpaths Improvement Group (LHFIG). This group operates within Wiltshire Council's devolved local government structure, where the proposals are further developed and approved by the Wiltshire Councillors on Calne Area board.

The Wiltshire Council Highways team developed the detailed design, but the estimated cost exceeded the area LHFIG budget. Consequently, it was submitted as a bid for "substantive highways scheme funding". This is an annual process at Wiltshire Council with a budget to fund larger schemes. To improve the likelihood of success,

contributions towards the costs were offered by Calne Without Parish Council, Calne Area Board, and the Shop Developers.

We are pleased to announce that our bid was successful, one of only eight selected in the county amid strong competition. This is a great example of the Parish and Wiltshire Council working together to bring investment into our village and make it a better and safer place to live. Road safety has been a key priority for Parish and Wiltshire Councillors in our area. Improvements made over the last 4 years include speed limit reductions, additional signage, deployment of speed indicator devices and more police enforcement. The long awaited 20mph speed limit for Studley and Norley Lane has recently been approved by Wiltshire Council Highways and will soon be implemented.

We look forward to building on these improvements in the coming months and years by promoting schemes across the new Derry Hill & Studley Parish.

Book Club Review

The Housemaid by Freida McFadden

Millie cannot believe her luck when as a homeless parolee she is offered a job by Nina and Andrew Winchester as a live-in housekeeper. On the surface, Nina Winchester seems to have the perfect life- a handsome, wealthy husband, a daughter (Cecelia), a beautiful home and wardrobes full of designer clothes. As she had been living in her car, Millie feels very lucky to have been offered such a well-paid job but starts to feel uneasy when she is shown to her room in the attic which only locks



from the outside. As the story progresses Millie finds herself at the mercy of Nina's highly erratic and disturbing behaviour. Nina and her daughter, Cecelia, seem to be going out of their way to make life as difficult as possible for Millie.

The narrator changes and we then hear Nina's side of the story. She fills in the gaps in her history and starts to change the reader's perspective on recent events in the Winchester household. She tells the reader about her life before she met Andrew and how she was swept off her feet by him and the promise of the comfortable life he could give her and her daughter. It becomes evident that things are not as they seem and aided by the gardener, Enzo, Nina comes up with a plan to resolve the situation. From this point the storyline takes another turn leading to a dramatic finale.

We found the book to be a page turner with a storyline that had lots of potential which remained unfulfilled. There were lots of missed opportunities to further develop the characters and delve in to their back stories which, in our opinion, meant that the author's writing style was simplistic and repetitive. The ending of the book was very trite and quite disappointing, it felt like the ground was being laid for a second book.

Despite this domestic thriller being highly popular on TikTok and receiving thousands of reviews on Amazon our thoughts were that the book did not live up to all the hype surrounding it. We agreed that it is a good holiday read and that we won't be rushing out to buy the sequel!
